#### APPEAL FOR LEADERS

**Snippets from the Minutes!** Parish Council are in discussions with Mellor Community Association who wish to be able to sell alcohol at up to 12 functions per year. Village Halls are a wonderful community asset, but need funds and volunteers to ensure their survival.

There will be a new Parish Notice board near the War Memorial and the smaller sized one will be re-sited, probably near the shops on Carter Fold.

Following guidance sought from Lancashire Association of Local Councils, it has been established that benches can be donated or sponsored by individuals or organisations for the benefit of the community and would not be considered to be a conflict of interest

**Highways Matters**: Parish Council, with neighbouring Parish Council, Borough Councillors & County Councillor Alan Schofield are seeking to work with Lancashire County Council as the Spine Road bisecting BAe Enterprise Park moves forward.

Speeding measures to encourage more responsible driving, particularly along Mellor Lane will hopefully at last be implemented soon, including a "Gateway Scheme" for Mellor Lane.

**Potholes & Drains** Potholes in the parish, as well as throughout the County continue to concern residents. A number of drains have been blocked over the winter, which means excess water is then further damaging roads. However, **ANYONE** can report potholes or blocked drains to Lancashire County Council, whose responsibility these matters are and Mellor Parish Council would urge all residents to do so, but also to keep the reference given, in order to build a picture of the overall problem.

The Parish Council can then take this series of references up with LCC.

Highways at LCC sent an update in March 2016: their target of repairing all actionable defects to roads & footpaths is 20 working days. Whilst it is accepted that the winter weather this year has been exceptional, it may be that you, as residents, find this figure difficult to agree with. However, the *target* is for *actionable defects*.

# REMEMBER: ALL RESIDENTS / ROAD USERS CAN REPORT DEFECTS, LCC MAY NOT ACT IF THEY DON'T KNOW ABOUT A DEFECT—HAVE YOU REPORTED ANY??

There are a number of ways to do so, but please remember to keep the reference log for that defect—you can track it on line for progress & it will help to build up a picture of defects in Mellor.

**BUS SERVICE**: Following the Special Meeting in January (when it looked as though there would be no Bus Service at all through Mellor) the Parish Council with support from Nigel Evans and especially LCC Cllr. Alan Schofield sought to have some service re-instated and thanks are due to Darwen Coach Services for providing this subsidised, but more limited service. Whilst this may not be as well as hoped for, it is under review and as with so many services, if not used, the future may be bleak.

#### **ROUND & ABOUT IN MELLOR**

It may be that you enjoy a walk around Mellor, if so, perhaps you would like to be more involved in your own village. This year, for the first time, Mellor Parish Council decided it was time to celebrate just what a lovely village Mellor is, and therefore Mellor has been entered in <a href="Lancashire's Best Kept Village Competition">Lancashire's Best Kept Village Competition</a>. This is judged on the WHOLE VILLAGE, looking for absence of weeds and litter, on roads, verges and in hedges etc., well cared for private properties, including the condition of grounds, hedges, walls, garages and other outbuildings, maintenance and tidiness of community buildings such as village halls, their car parks and railings & other public monuments such as war memorials; the cleanliness of bus shelters and telephone kiosks; well maintained open spaces, playing fields and children's play areas; condition of commercial premises and shops, including window displays and signs, and the maintenance of all places of worship, churchyards, cemeteries and grounds.

If EVERYBODY does their bit of cleaning & tidying, who knows what will happen when the judges come round—somewhere between 4th June and 17th July?

ALSO—Calling all walkers — the Public Footpaths in Lancashire are to be assessed, to ensure any which are known are included on the Definitive Map. Please have a look at www.mario.lancashire.gov.uk/ agsmario and if you use a footpath which is not on the Definitive Map, evidence needs to be collected in order to ensure future corrections. The Definitive Map may be inspected, by appointment at RVBC office.

As we approach the end of this civic year, I am pleased to take this opportunity to update you on what has been happening on the Parish Council during 2015-2016. Members continue to meet on the first Thursday of each month at 7pm in the Methodist Church. Our meetings are open to the public and residents of the parish are welcome to come along and raise matters of interest to them in the public session. For the coming year, we have increased our monthly meetings to also include August as this proved to be a busy period last year. This now takes us to eleven meetings each year, with only January being the month we do not meet.

Knowledge and experience in local matters is a most valuable resource to the council. Therefore in fulfilling the council's quota of ten councillors, as of May 2015, members were delighted to co-opt Mrs Pat Young, the council's former Chairman of 8 years and Borough Councillor Mrs Stella Brunskill both of whom have contributed so much to the council in their individual roles over the years. Of equal value are our two new councillors Mrs Dot Crooks and Mr Ian Moss who were warmly welcomed as co-opted members when joining in June 2015. Their commitment and enthusiasm to serve in the community has been evident throughout the year and is much appreciated by all.

The start of the civic year also saw Mrs Teresa Taylor begin as Parish Clerk from 1st June 2015, succeeding the combined roles of Mrs Fiona Murtagh who had undertaken the duties of clerk for the previous year and Mr Chris McDonald as Responsible Finance Officer (RFO). Special mention must also be given to Chris, having been the Parish Clerk for over 12 years before 'semi-retiring' to cover the RFO position only; Chris left a legacy of robust financial health for the council on his retirement and his sound advice and experience was much valued by all.

Amidst all the changes to personnel on the council, 2015-2016 has also marked a year of change in other council processes. Supported by the guiding hand of the clerk, council members are to be commended for how they have adapted to the change in how we administer the planning applications which are now processed online rather than the paper trail previously used. Residents are reminded that all applications are available to access via the Ribble Valley Borough website at <a href="https://www.ribblevalleyborough.gov.uk">www.ribblevalleyborough.gov.uk</a>. These will include reference to the recommendations given by the Parish Council for those applications we are requested to comment upon.

The website has also been given a mini makeover this year and alongside the parish and library notice boards it continues to be the place to access the forthcoming agenda and minutes of meetings, past newsletters and financial documents in an electronic format. The website is currently short of high quality pictures of the village that would be suitable to use as part of the site banner – so if there are any professional photographers who are happy to share their images please do get in touch.

#### So...what else has been going on then? (Chairman's Annual Report, continued)

As in previous years, the council has continued to work in partnership with Lancashire County Council, Ribble Valley Borough Council and other agencies to support the delivery of local services to the parish. It was particularly gratifying to receive the support of MP Nigel Evans when plans to discontinue the local bus service emerged late last year. Likewise the response from local residents who attended the special meeting in January and signed the petitions around the village. It is good to report that a core service has been retained between Mellor and Blackburn, albeit at a reduced service than it was before. The council will remain vigilant in keeping watch on how the service continues, and I encourage residents to get in touch should any further disruption or threats to the service occur again.

Speeding and the increasingly poor state of the roads have also been a regular issue raised by the council. I must express my appreciation to County Councillor Alan Schofield who has been most attentive to the community in his support of these issues on our behalf. I also commend the responsiveness of local residents in taking the time to raise the profile of these issues both to the parish council and to the relevant local authorities.

The ground work around the War Memorial gardens has developed into a longer-term project than first envisaged. A small group of volunteers come with bin bags, garden tools and a few jokes (you know who you are!) to clean and tidy up the grounds at regular times in the year. Others come unannounced, often to help prepare the area for the Remembrance Service to which we all owe our thanks. The bulb planting day last autumn began the start of the planting programme and was also well attended. Again I express my thanks to everyone who gave of their time and effort. However, to keep on top of the grounds throughout the year far more pairs of hands are needed. If you are interested in being involved please get in touch.

There are a number of benches coming up for either repair or replacement and so an evaluation of current village furniture is underway. Updating the children's play area on St Mary's Gardens is another long-term development being looked into. If you have any suggestions of your own or ideas you would like to raise please feel free to come along to the public session when we meet on the first Thursday of the month, or get in touch with myself or any of the parish councillors (*CONTACT DETAILS ON PAGE 3*).

#### **Money Matters**

Guided by the Annual Budget which sets out our spending plans the Council is committed to keeping running costs and expenditure at a responsible level. Internal and external audit ensures that our books and associated matters are in order. Details of the financial records for the year 2014/2015 are available for viewing on the parish council website at <a href="https://www.mellorpc.org.uk">www.mellorpc.org.uk</a>. Residents will be aware that the amounts payable to the Parish Council are consolidated and collected on our behalf by Ribble Valley Borough Council. It is worth noting that the council tax valuation bands for each property in Mellor are still based on the open market capital value as at 1 April 1991 and may therefore be subject to review in the future.

For the financial year 2015/16, and for the second year running, Mellor Parish Council levied a precept (charge) of £14,300, a reduction from £15,000 in 2013/14.

Mindful of the continuing economic difficulties facing Mellor residents the council approved the precept remain unchanged again for 2016/17. The precept compares favourably with the levy set 10 years ago of f16,000.

# The Game & Wildlife Conservation Trust's Third Big Farmland Bird Count took place between 6 and 14 February 2016. Here's what was seen by the nation's farmers:

More than 970 farmers took part, 130 different species were recorded, Herefordshire had most returns (66 farmers) The survey areas included important environmental features such as hedges, woodland, ponds, grass margins, ditches and trees. More than 50% of participants were providing some form of seed feed for birds, either as wild seed mixes, by scatter feeding or by feeding via hoppers. The five most abundant birds seen (which is different from the most commonly seen birds) were starlings, woodpigeons, fieldfares, rooks & lapwings. Seven species were recorded for the first time in 2016: these included black grouse, lesser redpolls, red grouse and snow buntings. The number of raptors seen this year was ten, whilst four owl species were also recorded. There were 25 Red List species recorded, including fieldfares, house sparrows, starlings, yellow hammers and song thrushes. ("Red List" is the highest conservation priority species, needing urgent action)

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## MCA NEWS—edited highlights!

Whilst I was getting my thoughts together for this update the sad news came through of the death of Mrs Marjorie McNicol. Marjorie was one of the driving forces behind the Mellor Sports and Social Club which later evolved into Mellor Community Association. It is through the hard work of people like Marjorie that we now have our village hall and, just as they no doubt were faced with the "you won't be able to do that" brigade, we have challenges to overcome as we maintain and develop that legacy for current and future residents of our village.

Our hall manager David Woodward does a tremendous job keeping everything in good order but again our fixtures and fittings are getting old and we have started planning for a phased renovation of the critical parts of the hall including sound-proofing between the main hall and the balcony areas and better access. Although well maintained, the inside of the building is looking dated and doesn't have all of the modern facilities needed nowadays. We are currently speaking with a number of providers to bring WiFi into the hall to enhance our services Just keeping the hall operating for business as usual costs typically around £650 per month, our income is almost entirely from our hall users and our thanks go out to you for continuing to support the hall.

We were delighted to receive a donation earlier in the year from a local resident, who wishes to remain anonymous, which along with a donation from Mellor Connections and the generous support of the British Heart Foundation, enabled us to acquire a Public Access Defibrillator and to fund a series of first aid courses. Regular hall users will have seen the illuminated yellow box by the main doors If you are interested in receiving training for use of a defibrillator, please get in touch.

We have several new regular users to go alongside our established groups like the guides, badminton, bowls, zumba, drama and singing.
