REMEMBRANCE DAY 2018

Mellor Parish Council was approached to arrange a special, community led, all age, Commemoration of the Centenary of Armistice Day.

It was decided from the start that this should particularly consider the young people of the area. It was also decided to encompass not only Mellor itself, but also Mellor Brook, Balderstone & Osbaldeston. Considerable work went into the details for the day. Pupils & Staff from all three primary schools in Mellor, Balderstone & Osbaldeston have been learning about the Great War, which showed in the displays seen in St. Mary's School on the day, as well as the beautiful individual ceramic poppies made by each child at St. Mary's School, Mellor.

Church Services were held in each Parish, then many came together in the rain to lay at least 20 wreaths at Mellor War Memorial, to remember The Fallen. in a Service led by Rev. Jefferson (St. Mary's) & Rev. Smith (Mellor Methodist)

The Millstone at Mellor generously provided soup & bread, which was much enjoyed in School, whilst looking at the displays & memorabilia. Grateful thanks go to Balderstone WI & volunteers for the tea, coffee & cake which followed. Local musicians from Mellor provided background music throughout, and they were accompanied by St. Mary's Choir who led community singing of songs from WW1 era.

Many volunteers brought this event together, and thanks are due to them all, however the lighting of the Beacon on Mellor Moor would not have been possible without Will Guilfoyle and he is therefore to be singled out for thanks & praise.

Mr. Bill Thompson of Mellor Brow has been to every Beacon event since 1937!!

WHAT HAS MELLOR PARISH COUNCIL DONE LATELY?

As you go around Mellor, you will hopefully see a number of changes in Mellor—some are not particularly significant (e.g. Plaques on benches) but some of the benches have been replaced too.

The old notice board which was sited at the War Memorial was moved to Carter Fold, by the shops and a replacement one erected. The War Memorial has had re-pointing to the flagged area, which will be cleaned up in readiness for the Remembrance Day Services. The area to the rear has had vegetation cleared, with planting to the front areas.

Mellor Play Area — has had much more work done than can easily be seen! The vital drainage works are not visible, but already seem to have made a significant difference., whilst the fencing means a much safer environment for children to be within and dogs excluded. Grateful thanks are expressed to the locals who rehung & painted the gate to the churchyard, and to the gentleman who removed the log beam which was identified as unsafe during the Annual Inspection.

UPDATE ON MELLOR CONNECTIONS

Mellor Connections is an informal social group open to anyone in Mellor and surrounding areas. We hold a number of different events throughout the year and although there is a small charge for some of these we are a not for profit group and all surplus income goes to a range of local and national charities.

Since we started about 4 years ago we have raised just over £12,000 which has gone to charities such as The Blackburn Free Project, The Air Ambulance, MacMillan Nursing, Headway Brain Injury Association and here in Mellor we continue to support and contribute to our fantastic facilities at Mellor Village Hall.

LOCAL ELECTIONS in MAY 2019

Mellor Parish Council will be part of the Local Election Programme for the coming year.

This may seem a long time off, but will soon be here!

"What does this mean for me?" You may well ask!

But local decisions are made at a local level, so if you care about your environment, why not get involved?

So, what does a Parish Council do? Your council is a corporate body, & the first tier of local government; therefore its decisions are the responsibility of the whole body. The Parish Council has some powers, including the power to raise money (through the precept, which is part of Council Tax) and some powers to spend this public money, within the powers laid down in law. These (directly or via financial support) could include:

- An evening bus taking people to the nearest town
- Pond clearing
- Equipment for a children's activity group

Can it have any bearing on my life? If you want it to do, definitely YES! The Parish Council is made up of people with different backgrounds, enthusiasms, interests & skills. Some work with ideas, whilst others may be very practical: some like accounts, others prefer reports.

The key is that a range of skills is needed to pull together as a team.

The job of the Council is to represent the interests of the whole community. Understanding the needs of different groups within the community (e.g. young and elderly people) is an important consideration. There will occasionally be a conflict of interest e.g. parents of young children and dog walkers may have differing views on uses for grassed areas in the Parish, but hopefully with open discussion such matters can be resolved.

Are there any rules for Parish Councils to follow? YES—in short, a Council must do what the law requires it to do, but only what the law permits & it cannot do anything unless permitted by legislation. (or it could be charged with acting *beyond its powers*).

There are numerous specified rules which must be followed, including holding at least 4 meetings per year (including the Annual Meeting) & appointing officers for carrying out the Council's functions. In Mellor Parish Council's case, this means a Parish Clerk who also acts as Responsible Financial Officer.

Council meetings must be open to the public (unless a sensitive matter is to be discussed) & the Council needs to comply with all appropriate legislation, including General Data Protection Rules.

It's important to remember that the rules are to protect people's rights (including yours) and to give confidence that the Council is properly run.

So, now you have had a think, how do you get involved?

Did you know that Mellor Parish Council has not had a contested Election for at least 20 years? Why not?

There are places for 10 Parish Councillors at Election Time but if there are 10 people or fewer who stand for election, they will automatically be elected. If there are vacancies, the new Parish Council may co-opt others who are willing to stand.

Can I stand for Election?

To stand for election to become a parish councillor you must be: At least 18 years old on the day of your nomination, and a **British** citizen, an eligible Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of any other member state of the European Union., living within 3km of the Parish Boundary

How do I stand for Election?

Ribble Valley Borough Council Returning Officer will issue forms following the announcement of the date of the Election. Parish Clerks will have more information nearer the time.

It is thought that doctor John McCrae (30 Nov. 1872 - 28 January 1918) began the draft for his famous poem

"In Flanders Fields" on the evening of the 2 May, 1915 in the second week of fighting during the Second Battle of Ypres.

John McCrae was serving as a Major and a military doctor and was second in command of the 1st Brigade Canadian Field Artillery. The field guns of his brigade's batteries were in position on the west bank of the Ypres-Yser canal, about two kilometres north of Ypres. The brigade had arrived there in the early hours of 23 April 1915.

It is believed that the death of his friend, Alexis Helmer, was the inspiration for McCrae's poem "In Flanders Fields". The exact details of when the first draft was written may never be known because there are various accounts by those who were with McCrae at that time.

- → One account says that he was seen writing the poem the next day, sitting on the rear step of an ambulance while looking at Helmer's grave and the vivid red poppies that were springing up amongst the graves in the burial ground.
- → Another account says that McCrae was so upset after Helmer's burial that he wrote the poem in twenty minutes in an attempt to compose himself.

A third account by his commanding officer, Lieutenant Colonel Morrison, states that John told him he drafted the poem partly to pass the time between the arrival of two groups of wounded at the first aid post and partly to experiment with different variations of the poem's metre.

On January 28, 1918, while still commanding No. 3 Canadian General Hospital (McGill) at Boulogne, McCrae died of pneumonia with "extensive pneumococcus meningitis". He was buried the following day in the Commonwealth War Graves Commission section of Wimereux Cemetery, just a couple of kilometres up the coast from Boulogne, with full military honours. His flag-draped coffin was borne on a gun carriage and the mourners — who included Sir Arthur Currie and many of McCrae's friends and staff — were preceded by McCrae's charger, "Bonfire", with McCrae's boots reversed in the stirrups. Bonfire was with McCrae from Valcartier, Quebec until his death and was much loved.

McCrae's gravestone is placed flat, as are all the others in the section, because of the unstable sandy soil.

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place: and in the sky The larks still bravely singing fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead: Short days ago, We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,

Loved and were loved: and now we lie

In Flanders fields!

Take up our quarrel with the foe
To you, from failing hands, we throw
The torch: be yours to hold it high
If ye break faith with us who die,
We shall not sleep, though poppies
grow
In Flanders fields

ROC Viewpoint on Mellor Moor

There is a post there & Parish Council (along with a lot of help from a resident) has just had the plaque renewed. Details are as follows:


Royal Observer Corps Underground Nuclear Monitoring Post.

This concrete structure formed the entrance to an underground monitoring post that would have been manned by the Royal Observer Corps during times of potential nuclear attack.

Built in 1959 and closed in 1968 the underground structure has now been sealed, the drawing below shows the layout of this compact construction. It had its own source of power, ventilation, communications, sanitation, food and water. Manned by three people, who would have had to remain in the post for at least 2 weeks, it was equipped to report nuclear explosions, with readings of the blast pressure, power and flash.

This post, along with over 1,500 others throughout the UK would then be able to track and report any nuclear fallout, keeping the local population informed of the level of danger.

Thankfully this network of underground monitoring posts have only ever been used for training and exercises.



This location, with its outstanding views, was also the site of a Roman signalling station overlooking the village of Ribchester from about AD80.

During the Second World War, an above ground lookout post was built here by the Royal Observer Corps for spotting, identifying and tracking hostile or friendly aircraft.

From the Archives

The Sisters of Nazareth have just celebrated 100 years of caring for older people in Blackburn.

Their former Nazareth House Care Home, in Preston New Road, at Beardwood, is currently undergoing a transformation into a closely you can find links with its past.

The site was once the home of brewer Daniel **Thwaites** II, which he had built in 1858 and named it Beardwood Cliff. It was subsequently purchased by the Thompson family who made their fortune in cotton, but when John Thompson died he expressed a wish that the house would be sold for a charitable purpose.

Around this time, in December 1912, the nuns from the Sisters of Nazareth had moved to Blackburn, at the invitation of the Bishop of Salford, and were living in two rented houses in St Alban's Place.

Conditions were cramped as the five Sisters set about caring for their first vulnerable children, and elderly residents, from areas of poverty and hardship within the town. Five years later, in 1917, when there were 35 people in their care, it was suggested they move to Beardwood Cliff, which they bought for £4,200, and renamed Nazareth House. Two rooms were converted into a chapel, some upstairs rooms became the convent, and the stables and garage were converted to classrooms.



The Thompson family memorial in St. Mary's Churchyard includes the inscription for Lieutenant Reginald Thompson, of Beardwood Cliffe. He died on 23rd October 1916 & is named on Thiepval Memorial to the

Gangs Target Vulnerable Teenagers

This was the headline in a recent Clitheroe Advertiser, but is there a problem in Mellor?

Recent events in Mellor, featured on social media suggest that there may be. Drug paraphernalia has been found on several occasions in Mellor & teenagers are abusing the new Play Area modern-day retirement village, but if you look equipment in the early hours of the morning. Who are they?

> Are they from Mellor? Do YOU know them? Are they your friends or relatives? Should we care? The answer must be YES!

> Police have issued warning signs for parents to spot if their child is being exploited to transport drugs. Lancashire Police are in the middle of a crackdown on County Lines drug gangs. Gangs often use young or vulnerable people to work as drugs runnerstransporting & storing drugs & cash. They use a dedicated mobile phone line to co-ordinate illegal drug dealing with customers in towns miles away. The runners have often been recruited using intimidation, deception, violence, debt bondage or grooming. During the grooming process, victims are likely to commit criminal offences, thus they can then be further intimidated. Recruits are usually young, and may be as young as 10. Those who have other issues e.g. Learning difficulties may be specially vulnerable, but the victims may be anyone in your community. This can only be combated if we all understand the exploitation, recognise how to spot the signs & then act upon it if we think exploitation is taking place.

Intelligence from the community to the police is key.

The warning signs may include:

- Going missing from home or school absence with no explanation
- Mixing with new friends parents do not know
- Experimental drug use, often cannabis
- Having more than one mobile phone
- Appearing nervous, scared, evasive and / or secretive
- Suffering injuries they cannot explain adequately
- Having tickets for train / coach travel

Net the Pond—if you forget, you will be fishing out soggy plants all winter

Cut, Clean & Clear—cut back plants, clear out the shed & greenhouse before storing away everything for winter.

Don't let leaves build up—They'll soon turn slippery when wet. Instead, gather them up & store in bin bags with small holes in—then you will have leaf mould—a great soil improver!
