To his amusement, he became the oldest artist ever to claim the UK No 1 spot with his cover of "You'll Never Walk Alone" in collaboration with Michael Ball and the NHS "Voices of Care" choir.

I'm sure we all know his background story which has been repeated many times. What I would like to say is that Captain Tom took the decision to do whatever he could in support of the fight against this dreadful virus and embarked on a successful mission for which he will be forever remembered.

He did not, for one minute, think about himself, but thought about all the sacrifices being made by others and how he could help.

My lasting memory of Captain Sir Tom Moore was his sense of optimism. There are many quotes worthy of reflection but this one, in particular says it all

"We will get through it in the end but it might take time, but at the end of the day we shall all be OK again... the sun will shine on you again and the clouds will go away"
